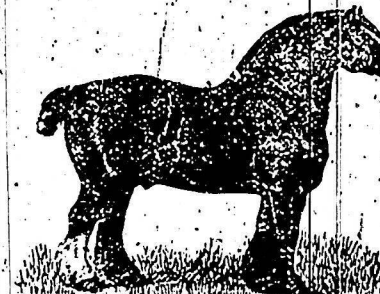
**McKIBBON - HEWITT**
