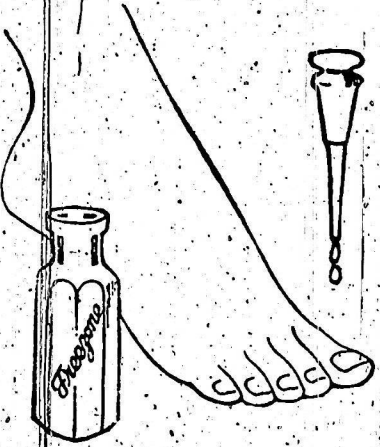
UNAPPRECIATED ADVANTAGES.

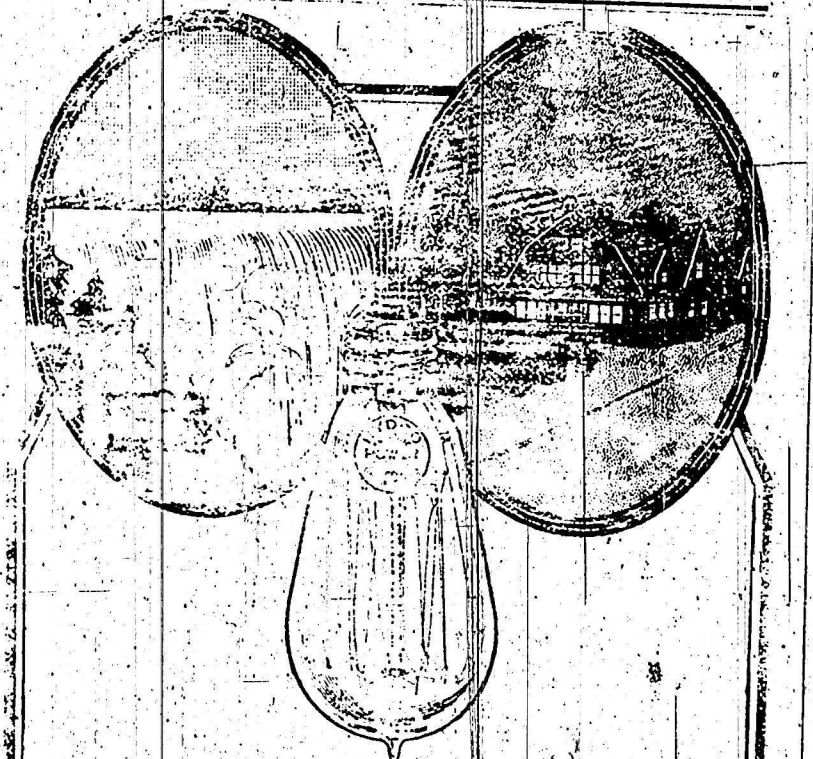
