PRESENTATION.

On the evening of Friday, April 25, friends and neighbors of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Kirktown gathered at their home to welcome her two sons, Ptes. A. C. and Robert Stewart, who came from Scotland with her six years ago. Both enlisted in the 147th and were drafted to the 4th C.M.R.'s in France. The former lost the sight of an eye, and the latter had his left leg amputated on account of his wounds. He was also severely wounded in his left wrist. The people showed their patriotism by subscribing over \$70. A very enjoyable time was spent in dancing, etc. The following address was read by E. Beirnes for Pte. R. Stewart:

Dear Friend.—It is with mixed feelings of joy and sorrow that we gather here to welcome you, glad because you are safe, at home once more, but sorrowful that you return to us under a great handicap. You offered your young life to save your country from the villainy of an atrocious foe, you have endured the discomforts of trench life and suffered the pain of grievous wounds. You came as a boy among us, a stranger in a strange land, but you have proven yourself a man among men, able and willing to face the terrors of a great war to save the world from the horrors of German domination, and to prove to us in a tangible way that we appreciate very much the benefits that your sacrifice and of countless others has bought for us, we ask you to accept this money, fully realizing that it is a paltry price to pay for British liberty which we are still able to enjoy. The following is the address:

To Mr. Stewart Thompson, Wodehouse:

Dear Friend Stewart.—We your old friends and neighbors in the vicinity have met here to-night to honor you for the part you have played in the great war. We are much pleased to have you with us again after the close call you had for your life. We are glad that you have been spared to return from overseas to be among your relatives and friends here. We feel sure that had you escaped the bullet that so nearly cost you your life that you would very soon have risen above the rank of Private in the Army. We are proud because you represented our neighborhood in the terrible struggle for the cause of right and humanity; we are proud because you enlisted and went manfully to the front and into the battle for the liberty of the world and our homes. We have gathered here to-night to make you a small present, (the value of which is small in consideration of the part you took.) This small gift is just to show you that we honor you and appreciate you for your manliness and we now ask you to accept this purse as a token of our respect and pride and as a proof of our sincere appreciation and heartfelt good wishes of a host of friends and that you may long be spared to enjoy the fruits of the victory which you did your part to help win, is the prayer of the people of this section.
