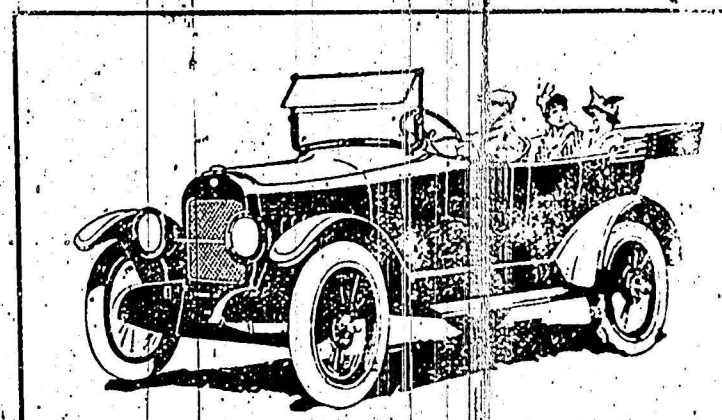
The Address: Berksley, May 14th, 1919.

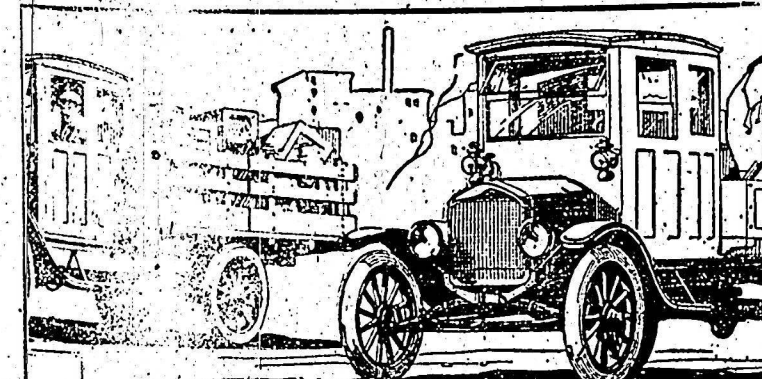
