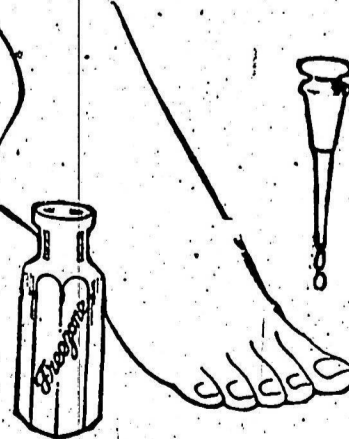
HEATHCOTE
