FROM OWEN SOUND

We give below a few sentences from the O. S. Sun-Times, re the Purchasing Committee.

The purchasing sub-committee of the County Roads Committee were under fire from Mr. Calder (Durham) and other members of the County Council on Wednesday afternoon.

Charges of great weight were made or even insinuated, but gossip throughout the county was not so kind. Fortunately the committee were able to show that their actions were perfectly clean and above-board and, while admitting that mistakes had been made, and willing to accept their share of blame for these, they emerged from the cross-fire of criticism with their honor untarnished.

Contrary to expectations, the onslaught was directed by Mr. Calder, being having considered, Dr. Mann's name with the position of chief objector. The discharge, varied hot at times and drew forth clear and distinct protestations of good faith from the members of the committee.

The explanations so far given have been clear and succinct and have done a great deal to restore confidence in the county roads scheme.
