The transformation of the fair women and social butterflies of England to workers in hospitals and munition factories, is shown in a series of remarkable pictures.  
Among the many notable personages who take part in the development of the story are included Queen Alexandra, the Princess Monaco, the Countess of Masserene, Lady John Lavery, Miss Bettina Stuart-Wortley, Miss Violet Keppel, the Countess of Droghda, Lady Diana Manners, daughter of the Duke of Rutland, and the most famous beauty in English society, Miss Elizabeth Asquith, the daughter of the former Prime Minister of England, and others.
