Donald and Mrs. Barnes arrived from the West on Saturday evening bringing a beautiful wreath of roses and gladioli as a family tribute.

Mr. McRae has been an invalid for over fifteen years, being subject to asthma and heart trouble, yet was able to be about most of the time. During all these years and his last illness Mrs. McRae has ministered to him with devoted wifely care and the members of the family can look back without regret, for their father's life has ever been manifested. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon to Priceville cemetery, Rev. Mr. McCarten, Methodist Minister, officiating in the absence of deceased's own pastor. Mr. McRae was a lifelong member of the Presbyterian Church, a Liberal-Reformer in politics, a man of honor and upright-ness in his daily life, a citizen highly respected and well connected. Besides his wife and family named, who mourn his loss, are a daughter Ruth, by his first marriage, a brother John in Priceville and Duncan, somewhere in the West. 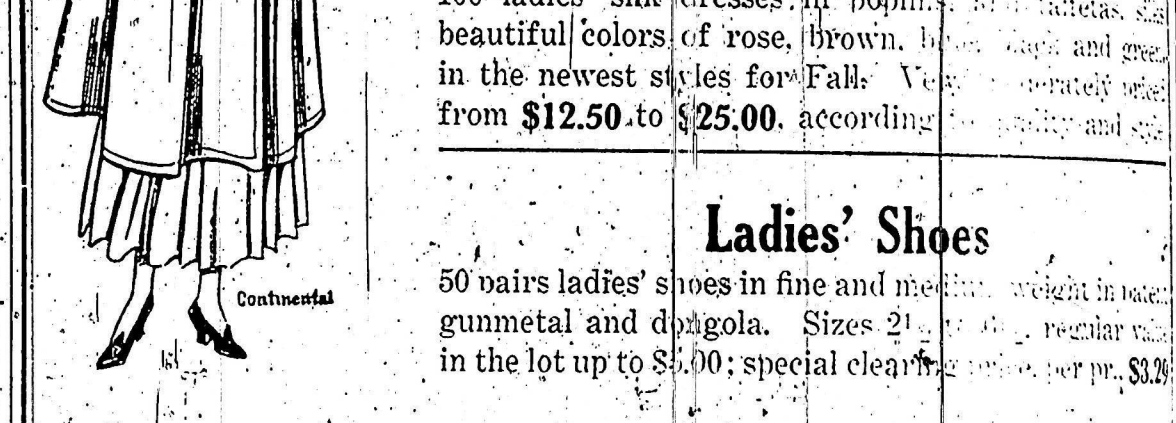
