Owen Sound and Allenford stage has been discarded as a result of the opening of the Park Road branch of the G. T. R.

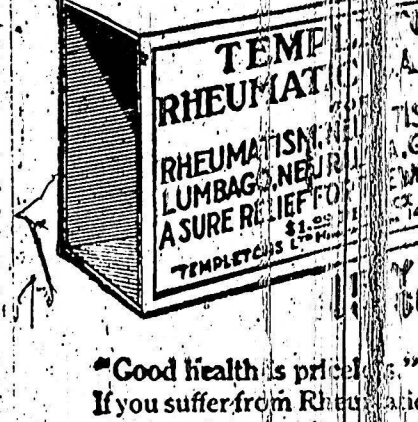
The Meaford Monitor suffered loss last week on account of fire in an adjacent building.

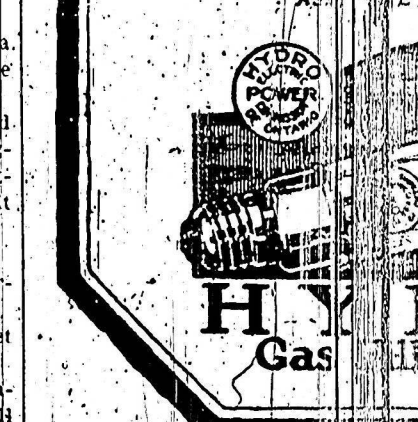

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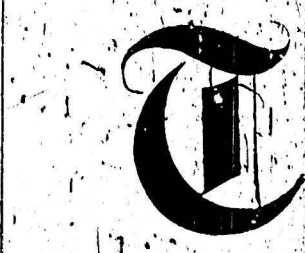
