To the Electors of Centre Grey:

Ladies and Gentlemen:—At a very

large and representative convention

held at Rocklyn, I was nominated to

contest the riding of Centre Grey

in the interest of the United Farmers

of Ontario and I am in the field asking

for your votes as a farmer candidate

to represent the constituency in the

next Legislature of the Province of

Ontario.

It has been falsely stated that I was

put forward as a nominee in reality

of the Liberal politicians of this riding.

I do not know and have never

known the Liberal leaders in Centre

Grey and have never been in com-

munication with them directly or in-

directly.

I am contesting Centre Grey as a

farmer candidate, just as much in

opposition to the official Liberal

party as to the Conservative party.

It appears to me that under the

present party system, where one

party has a sufficiently powerful ma-

jority to force its will upon the

Legislature, we shall never have a

proper discussion or appreciation of

questions effecting the public as a

whole. I submit that it would make

for better government if, instead of

the present two parties, we had in

addition a fairly strong agricultural

and labor group, independent of

the old line parties. We would at

all events have an intelligent dis-

cussion of questions of interest to the

farmer and laborer who form the

bulk of our population. As it is now,

these are legislated upon in a manner

calculated to advance party politi-

cal interests, often to the detriment of

the two great and important sections
