## WILL NOT REPRESENT THE PEOPLE

(O. S. Sun-Times)

The ninth plank of the U.F.O. platform which proposes to "extend the policy and practice of the legislative branch through the initiative and referendum" is a feature of their program does not commend itself to the fair minded elector. It means that each candidate of the U.F.O. must pledge himself to vote as the Executive of the U.F.O. desires and to resign if he does not do so. In other words, he must vote and act as the autocrat Executive of the United Farmers' dictates. There are many cases where there would not even be time to consult the Executive as to how a Member of Parliament should vote. What is the U.F.O. member to do in such cases? On all questions that come up for discussion in the Legislature the Member being in the House and hearing the discussion from all angles should be the one who would know best how to vote. And yet if he used his own best judgment he is liable to be asked to resign by the Executive who have not the same opportunity of judging the proper stand to take on the question at issue. UNDER THIS SYSTEM, CANDIDATE TAYLOR WOULD NOT BE A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE PEOPLE BUT THE SLAVE OF THE EXECUTIVE. One gets a glimpse of the autocratic attitude of this Executive in the rule and abrupt treatment which was accorded to the U.F.O. delegate at the recent Convention at Owen Sound. Mr. George Bothwell, of Saugeen, when he made a very reasonable request at this U.F.O. Convention, that the farmers present desire to know who are the officers and who are the Executive of the movement in North Grey, and whether or not the delegates should have any say in their election of the organization. Mr. Bothwell was told in effect that the whole matter was settled and that he had better mind his own business!
