

MINIMUM OBJECTIVE OF NEW VICTORY LOAN IS \$300,000,000

The Choice of Maturity Five-Year or Fifteen-Year Bonds, Interest at 5½ Per Cent., May be Paid For on Application in Five Instalments.

A despatch from Ottawa says: The Minister of Finance, Sir Henry D. Miller, today announced the terms of the forthcoming Victory Loan. The minimum amount of \$300,000,000 will be raised in five instalments. As in previous years, subscribers will be given a choice of maturity: five-year bonds, 5½ per cent. interest; or fifteen-year bonds, 5½ per cent. interest. The interest will be paid semi-annually in arrears. The Government will carry the interest of the loan until it is paid for by the subscribers. The interest will be 5½ per cent. on the original investment, and will be paid in five instalments. The first instalment will be paid on October 1, 1920. The interest will be paid on the first of each month thereafter. The Government will also accept applications for the loan in the form of stock certificates. Illiteracy in Canada Costs 75 Millions

A despatch from Winnipeg says: Starting figures on the illiteracy in Canada as a whole were given by Dr. J. T. M. Anderson of Regina at the session of the National Educational Conference, with the declaration that this illiteracy costs the country annually \$75,000,000 in lowered production. Unified action by all the provinces in overcoming it was suggested, with a grant of a half million dollars toward the work from the Federal Government and a similar amount from the provinces.
Dr. M. Fairchild of Washington, D. C., said there was great danger in Canada and the United States of a popular uprising in sympathy with European Socialistic adjustments.

FARMERS WIN THREE SEATS IN DOMINION BY-ELECTION

Fiume to be Governed by President and Cabinet

The National Council of Fiume, organized Oct. 30, 1918, for the purpose of representing Italian annexionist claims, has made public the method of its solution, which will occur automatically on the election of a Municipal Assembly by order of Gabriele D'Annunzio. The Council in a proclamation establishes the form of government for Fiume, consisting of an Assembly and a Cabinet, headed by a President who will be chosen by the members of the Assembly. The Cabinet will be divided into the Departments of the Interior, Treasury, Commerce, Transportation, Education and Justice.

Prince Delivers Personal Letter From Queen Mary

A despatch from Brantford says: A letter of thanks from Queen Mary, delivered personally by his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, is in the proud possession of Miss Gilmour of this city, one of the most faithful of the life and work of Miss Gilmour. The Prince had previously been forwarded to the Queen by the local patriotic workers, and it was a great surprise when the Prince handed Miss Gilmour the Queen's letter of appreciation on Monday last.

Aviator Loops the Loop 624 Times in Single Flight

Madrid, Oct. 27.—Alfred Flavel, a French aviator, looped the loop 624 times in a single flight in a military airplane here to-day. The previous record was a little over 300 loops in the air two hours. He descended owing to a leak in his petrol tank.

HALF A MILLION COAL MINERS GO ON STRIKE IN UNITED STATES

Washington Conference Fails to Avert Trouble and of President Wilson Unavailing. A despatch from Washington says: The last Government effort to avert the coal strike set for November 1 failed utterly and half a million miners quit work on the very eve of winter, with the nation's bins running dangerously low.
When an appeal from President Wilson, sick in bed at the White House, was not enough to bring peace to the conference, that was torn and on the breaking point half a dozen times during the day. Charges and counter-charges flew thick and fast as the groups of operators and miners filed out of the meetings which began somewhat hopefully four days ago.
