STARTING WITH THE TROUBLE IN THE TROUBLE CASE

There is no good reason why the newly organized Royal Canadian Mounted Police should not extend its protecting arm over the entire Dominion as was suggested a few days ago by members of the Opposition at Ottawa. The present county constable system obtaining in the older provinces is an obsolete and decrepit institution. Long ago it was our one familiar with the western provinces has anything but admiration for the Northwest Mounted. Who are now being consolidated into this new body the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. As the taxpayers of all the provinces are contributing to the upkeep of this

and mines all contribute their part of the revenue but by far the greatest returns will be derived from agriculture which industry we must continue to establish in permanency and increase in magnitude. One of the great responsibilities that falls either the federal or provincial departments of agriculture is the conservation of the great wealth that lies in the virgin soil. Innumerable considerations are involved in this one problem, but the whole affair can be accomplished if we engage in mixed farming with live stock as a basis. This is the fundamental principle underlying success in agriculture.

TESTING SEEDS FOR FARMERS AND MERCHANTS

The Dominion Seed branch with laboratories at Ottawa, Winnipeg and Calgary reported over 35,000 seed tests for the year ending June 30th. The growth of seed testing in Canada is indicated from the fact that only 3,775 samples were reported in 1909. The great bulk of the work in our seed laboratories is done between September and June when each laboratory may handle up to two hundred samples per day. Only test samples are tested free of charge for any farmer or seed merchant during the season. Over this number, the service is charged for at cost.

Official seed testing is the basis of Government seed control, which in older European countries is rated as a leading Government service to Agriculture. Any country without an efficient system of seed control soon becomes the dumping ground for inferior seeds from other countries, and low-grade homegrown seed may be sold to unsuspecting farmers. Our system is frequently referred to in other countries as being the most efficient. Its importance is now being better appreciated when it is required that imported seeds are not released from bond until they are approved at the seed laboratories and when cereal grains, flax, corn, as well as clover and grass seeds, are marked on the basis of fixed quality seed grade standards.
