What New Order-in-Council Means to Ex-Members of any of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces Regarding Vocational Training.

(1) Ex-Members of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces discharged before November 1st, 1919, must make application for Vocational Training on or before February 1st, 1920.

(2) Those discharged after November 1st, 1919, must apply within three months from date of such discharge.

(3) Members of the C. E. F. not discharged and now in Hospital must make application within three months of their discharge from such Hospital of C. E. F.

(4) Those who have been transferred direct from the C. E. F. to the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment for treatment, must apply within three months from the date of their discharge from the D. S. C. R.
