A very practical and suitable memorial to three brave men who gave their lives in France is the one thoughtfully designed and planned by the Women's Institute of Vandeaur. They have chosen a ward in the General and Marine Hospital as their own special care and have provided it very costly in white, providing bed and bedding, invalid bedside table, chiffonier, upholstered Morris chair and foot rest and dainty curtains. On a brass plate on the door are the names of the three men in whose memory the gift is made. Vandeaur boys, who died for their country, Charles Buchanan, Edgar Hutchinson and Ernest Hoyle, and later a plate of wood will be placed in the room with the little story of the gallant sacrifice. The president of the Institute, who came up herself to super- tend the arrangements is Miss Gil- bert, and Miss T. Buchanan as Sec- retary. The superintendent and staff at the Hospital are very proud of the new ward and every visitor to the building is interested in this very beautiful gift, for the benefit of the sick and suffering, and in honor of three gallant men.
