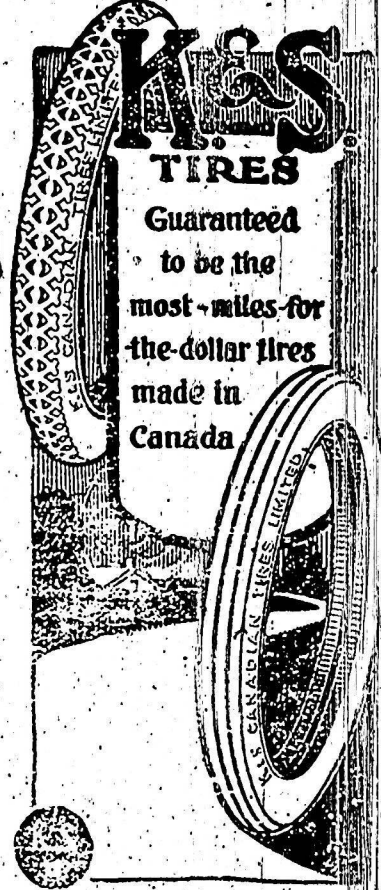

DEATH OF GEORGE RYAN

Mr. George Ryan, whose serious illness we referred to last week, passed away on Friday afternoon about four o'clock.

He was born in the County of Cavan, Ireland, in April, 1829, and was therefore 91 years of age at the time of his death. At the age of 19 years he came to Canada and lived for three or four years in the Township of Esquimaux, where he married Miss Jane Woods, with whom he moved shortly afterwards to Glenelg, near Edge Hill, and remained some seven or eight years there, and at Morton's Corners, before going to the Rob Roy, where he ran a hotel in connection with his farm for thirty-five years. He came to Durham twenty-one years ago, to the Central Hotel, where he spent a short time before retiring from the business.

For over thirty years he has been engaged mostly in the sheep business, and he is well and favorably known in all the adjacent townships for his honest and honorable dealing with the public.

Besides his widow, he leaves seven of a family, three sons: William, George and Robert, all in town; and four daughters: Mary (Mrs. Nichol), Eliza (Mrs. Robt. Douglas), Annie (Mrs. John Whitaker), all in Durham, and Margaret (Mrs. Cairns), who resides in Hamilton. One son, Thomas, died six or seven years ago.

The deceased was an Anglican in religion, and a Conservative in politics. He has been an Orangeman for many years, and the funeral was conducted under the auspices of the order, who paid him their last tribute of respect as the remains were laid to rest in Durham cemetery on Sunday afternoon. The Rev. F. G. Hardy of Trinity Church officiated at the burial.—Durham Chronicle.
