ANNOUNCEMENT

The public will be governed by the following Sections from the Board of Health Act, regarding Communicable Diseases:
52.—(1) Whenever any household-keeper knows or has reason to suspect that any person with his family or household, or boarding or lodging with him, has any communicable disease, he shall, within twelve hours, give notice thereof to the Secretary of the local Board or to the Medical Officer of Health.
(2) Notice may be given to the Secretary or to the Medical Officer of Health at his office, or by letter addressed to either of them and mailed within the time above specified.

71.—(3) Every person contravening the provision of subsection 1 or of subsection 2 shall incur a penalty of \$100. 2 Geo. V. c. 58, s. 71.
