Owen Sound, June 18th. Owen  
Sound is in the peculiar position of  
claiming to be a city when it is not  
one, and cannot be one (1) June 18th,  
according to Hon. J. B. Lucas, who ad-  
dressed the County Council here this  
afternoon. At the last session of  
the Ontario Legislature an Act was  
passed incorporating Owen Sound  
as a city on June 11, 1912. Mr.  
Lucas claims that according to  
the Statute Law Amendment Act of  
1918 no act is in force until 60 days  
after the date of assent, so that  
leave Owen Sound a town 60  
days after the House has passed
