On the right hand and on the left the necessity is emphasized for specializing, not only in manufacturing and mercantile life, but also the wisdom of a system of intense farming. This is indeed commendable, but what is of even greater importance in this period of unrest is a more intense vital Christian life on the part of the individual.

The Shelburne Free Press last week gave a column and a half list of real estate changes in Melancthon which took place during the past year. Eight thousand two hundred and twenty-five acres in all changed hands. The assessor kindly furnished the list.

A prominent newspaperman at the recent press annual meeting in Toronto emphasized the seriousness of present conditions by stating that unless publishers raised both their subscription and advertising rates some of them would be obliged to go out of business.

The recent amendment to the Motor Vehicles Act in Ontario is a decisive and commendable step in the right direction. The amendment makes "the penalty for being in charge of a motor vehicle while intoxicated, imprisonment without the option of a fine."

The auto has been blamed for causing sparsely attended church services, but it is not entitled to some credit for bringing out in some cases whole families, many of whom seldom had the privilege of attending prior to the advent of the automobile. It was quite a common thing to see from ten to twenty-five cars lined up around the Methodist church in Markdale, even on the evening of week days during the recent evangelistic campaign.

The Mount Forest Confederates last week gave some good advice, urging laborers to first ponder well all the circumstances of any proposed strike. The press can do much in this way. Loyalty to a town or local industry should have much weight among employers.

Prohibition having put an end to the road of the "gold cars" the old Kesley Institute in Toronto has been sold for a private hospital.

The Consolidated Telephone Co. has resumed operations at Caledon after a prolonged interruption with service suspended.

The Neustad Creamery conducted by The Saugene Valley Creamery Association, has gone into liquidation. The Acton Free Press last week gave an excellent report of a monster and commendable picnic held in that town on Saturday, June 12th, by the Beardmore Leather Company. There were in the gathering the proprietors and employees with their families one thousand people. The write-up is embellished with two cuts, one 4x16 of the gathering, and the other 3 1/2 x 12 inches of the members of the joint committee. This sort of family gathering is a refreshing contrast with the prevailing strikes.

Mr. William Elliott, publisher of the Mitchell Recorder and for five years Mayor of the town, died suddenly while delivering an address at a Masonic function on the evening of Tuesday, June 15th.
