U. S. STAND ON LEAGUE, WEAKENS FRIENDSHIP.

Chicago, July 1.—The strong friendship existing between Canada and the United States is being weakened by the stand of the United States toward the League of Nations, David R. Forgan, (Chicago) banker, declared before the Canadian Club of Chicago at its Dominion Day banquet.

"Or all the nations in the world, Canada is the most settled and in the most prosperous condition," he said. "Canada did not send her Prime Minister to the Paris Conference to dictate what some little half-baked country wanted," he said. "She sent her Prime Minister there to look after Canada's interests on an equality with the Mother Country, and she got it."

"The strong friendship between the two countries, I am sorry to say, may not exist there now, owing to our own country's attitude regarding peace, the feeling being that we went over there for a purpose and have gone back on that purpose."
