Miss Mary Hestie came up from Toronto on Thursday last to spend her holidays with her sister, Mrs. G. E. Hart.

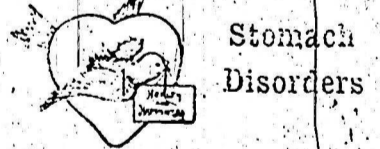
Quite a number spent the twelfth at Mount Forest, while others went over to the celebration at Eganville.

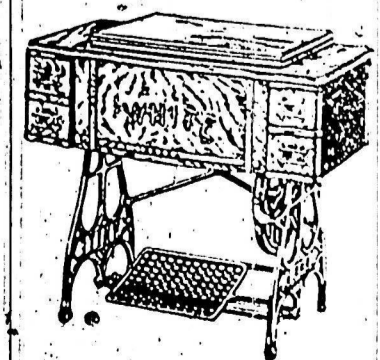
