## A FORTUNATE ESCAPE

While returning from Markdale to his home last Friday, Mr. Bob Lindsay, with five others, in his car providentially escaped death or serious injury. He was climbing the big hill after crossing the river, on the side-road west of Trafalgar, when in changing his gears, the car started backwards. Brakes were applied quickly but it did not stop. The car was on the road, struck a tree six inches in diameter and jumped over this under the tree, becoming completely out of control. It then took a centrifugal dip down over the cliff into the river two of the occupants having previously jumped. The car hit a tree and the four occupants were in three or four feet of water but unharmed. All landing unscathed in a group of bushes and the car rolled out when a fresh supply of oil was poured over it.
