One huge sign announces that: "The use of tobacco in any form is a dirty, filthy, disgusting, degrading habit, and that visitors have no more right to pollute with tobacco smoke the air clean people breathe than he would have to spit in the water which they drink."

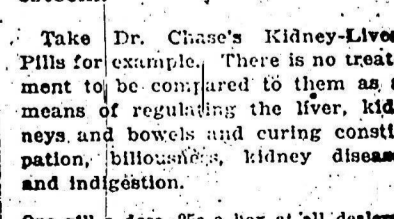

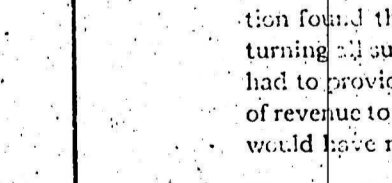
