But for the freight rate the only possible relief is a reduction to 35 per cent. Milk and a few other commodities are not to be increased.

MAY RESTRICT THE SALE OF "TEMPERANCE BEERS."

Municipalities in Ontario hereafter may, by passing by-laws, limit the sale of temperance beers to the holders of standard hotel licenses. At present restaurant keepers in almost every city and town are selling beer of less than 2 1/2 per cent. There is little control of its sale. An order in Council has been passed and published in the Ontario Gazette which says cities, towns, villages and townships may pass by-laws "for granting the exclusive right of reselling in the municipality malt products, commonly called temperance beers, to the keepers of standard hotels licensed under the Ontario temperance act." Such by-law may be passed after September 1st, 1920.—Globe.
