

Caron, \$6.88, R. Akitt, \$3.80, C. Newell, \$10.30, L. Fisher, \$1.20, A. Birrell, \$1.10, Jas. Watson, \$6.30, W. G. Jameson, \$12.50; E. Baker, tongue for grading, \$2.50.

Cameron — Bachelor — That this council hereby requests the Provincial Government to apply to the Dominion Railway Board for a postponement of the life hearing of the application of the Bell Telephone Co. for increase of its rates until the municipalities with the Provincial Government make arrangements for the extirpation of the system in Ontario, carried.
