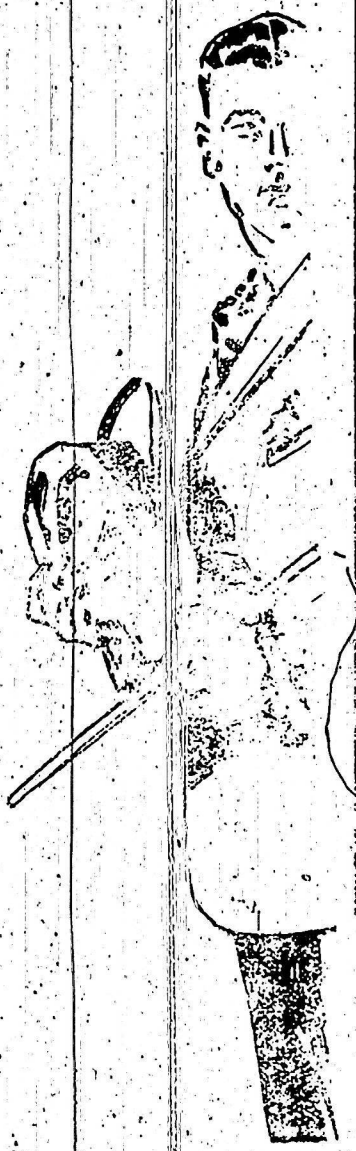

Communications as follows were read: From city clerk of Toronto re Bell Telephone Co., chief clerk of Department of Highways stating that the government had assumed the Toronto line through this township as a provincial highway from Sept. 1, 1920; the Reeve and Mr. Mathewson report on building bridge on Graham's deviation; Mr. Mathewson's report of expenditure of \$29.35 in his division. By-laws 16, to appoint collectors, and 17, to levy rates for 1920, were read a third time and finally passed. The following accounts were ordered to be paid: The Reeve \$25, and Mr. Mathewson \$32, for services re Graham bridge; H. L. Douglas, \$16 for sheep killed by dogs; gravel accounts: Allan McLean, \$2.50, W. J. McMillan, \$7.50, D. Symes \$3.00, Jas. Oliver \$2.10, J. Carson \$9.50, B. Wickens \$2.20, C. Moore \$4.30, F. De Camps \$8.88, R. Akitt, \$3.80; C. Newell \$10.20, L. Fisher \$1.20, G. Binnie \$1.10, Jas. Watson \$6.30, W. G. James \$12.50; E. Baker, tongue for grader, \$2.50. Cameron—Batchelor—That this Council hereby requests the Provincial Government to apply to the Dominion Railway Board for a postponement of the date of the hearing of the application of the Bell Telephone Co. for increase of its rates until the municipalities with the Provincial Government make arrangements for the expiration of the system in Ontario. Carried. The Council adjourned.—Advance.

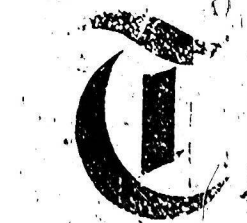
