

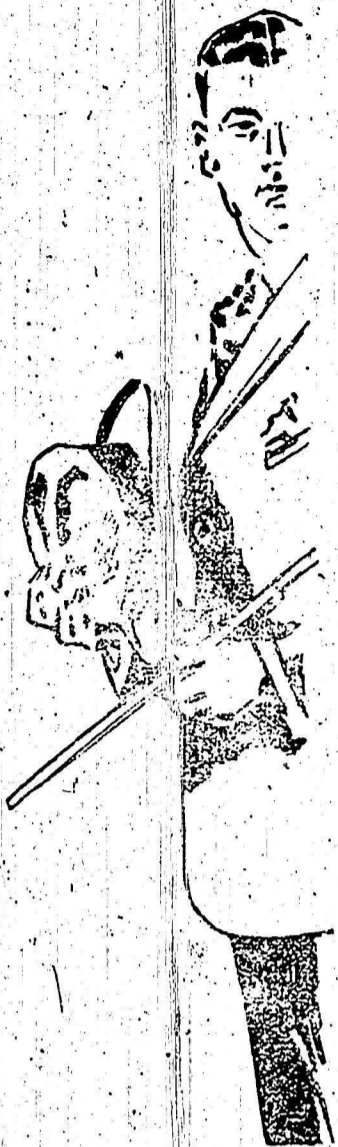

MARGARET L. BEACH, died Monday morning, October 11th, at her home, 115 Main St., Markdale, Ontario, after a long illness. She was born in New York, and spent her childhood in the city of New York. She was a devoted wife and mother, and was well known in the community. Her funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church, Markdale, on October 12th, at 11 o'clock a.m. Burial was in the Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Markdale.

During her lifetime Mrs. Beach displayed a most exemplary Christian character, ever gentle, patient and cheerful. Her death was always a surprise to those who loved her, but she was able to meet her departure with a calm and trusting spirit. Always a close student of public affairs, he soon became prominent in municipal matters, and was for several years a member of the Township Council and for five years its Reeve. In 1912 he was appointed Manager of the House of Refuge, succeeding the late Thomas Barnes, and filled the position with credit until June, 1919, when failing health compelled him to resign. He then moved to Owen Sound.

Besides his wife, he leaves two daughters, Misses Janet and Jean. His mother, three brothers, Angus, of Sydneyham, John and D. E., of Derby, and one sister, Mrs. Walter Hills, Elderslie, also survive. The funeral took place Monday afternoon at Tara cemetery; the services were conducted by Rev. W. McDonald, pastor of the Baptist Church, of which he was a member.
