"NO SMOKING ALLOWED"

(Toronto Telegram.)

Following an outbreak of fire in the York Law Association's offices on the third floor of the City Hall, Property Commissioner Chisholm today took steps to prohibit all smoking in the building. Notices have been issued to the elevator men, giving them strict instructions to enforce the "no smoking" regulation. Several people who for years have wandered in and out of the hall with a pipe or cigar between their lips were held up to day and the contraband removed.

It is not surprising how would-be authorities will presume to thus interfere with the liberties of people. Even placards have been placed conspicuously in public buildings for the same purpose. This class of people usually ignore all such attempts at interfering with their liberties. Of course, many a disastereous fire has occurred from cigar stubs and wads are found daily marked from march to march, to say nothing about the increasing fumes from the incense. There must, however, be supreme gratification in the use of the word "no smoking" interference with their liberties cannot be tolerated.
