Mr. W.T.R. Preston, Liberal candidate for Durham County, for House of Commons, is by no means singular in the view that Government positions in the outside service such as the Customs, Post Office and Inland Revenue, etc., etc., should be made on the recommendations of the representative of the Riding in Parliament and naturally the appointee shall be among the electorate of the constituency, such vacancies being now filled by a Civil Service Commission at Ottawa. The question is whether these responsibilities should be assumed by selected representatives of electors who are responsible to the public or by an autocratic body which is responsible to nobody. The public do not want to abrogate all their rights and privileges to commissions over which they have no control.

There are far too many commissions who draw big pay and seldom accomplish much of benefit to the country.
