OBITUARIES MRS. J. B. THIBAUDEAU One of the oldest pioneers of this vicinity passed away when Mrs. J. B. Thibaudau died Sunday, October 24, at the home of her daughter-in-law, Mrs. P. Thibaudau. She had been a resident of Canada seventy years, sixty-five of which were spent in this part. The late Mrs. Thibaudau, whose maiden name was Jane Whiting, was born in Cornwall, England, eighty-seven years ago. She came to Canada when seventeen and with her people settled at Muddy York, now Toronto. She was married in 1851 to the late John B. Thibaudau, who predeceased her in 1892. After marriage, the pioneer couple settled in Glenelg in 1855 and later on the Toronto Line. Notwithstanding the strenuous life of the pioneer, she retained a good degree of health and vigor. In July 1913, on the occasion of her 81st birthday, the eight children gathered in a happy reunion and found her hale and hearty for her years and still busy, working in a well-kept garden. About a year ago she became very feeble and gradually failed until her death. The funeral which was largely attended took place Wednesday afternoon and

the remains were tenderly laid away in the family plot in Markdale Public Cemetery. Many beautiful floral tokens of sympathy and respect were placed upon the casket. Rev. A. P. Stanley, assisted by Rev. J. Thurburn Conn, conducted the services. The surviving members of the family are: L. X. Thibaudau, (Ithaca, Mich.); Mrs. John McNirol, Bay City, Mich.; Mrs. E. S.
