Epworth League next Monday night in charge of the citizenship department. Twelve sacred Triples of the Bible will be studied.

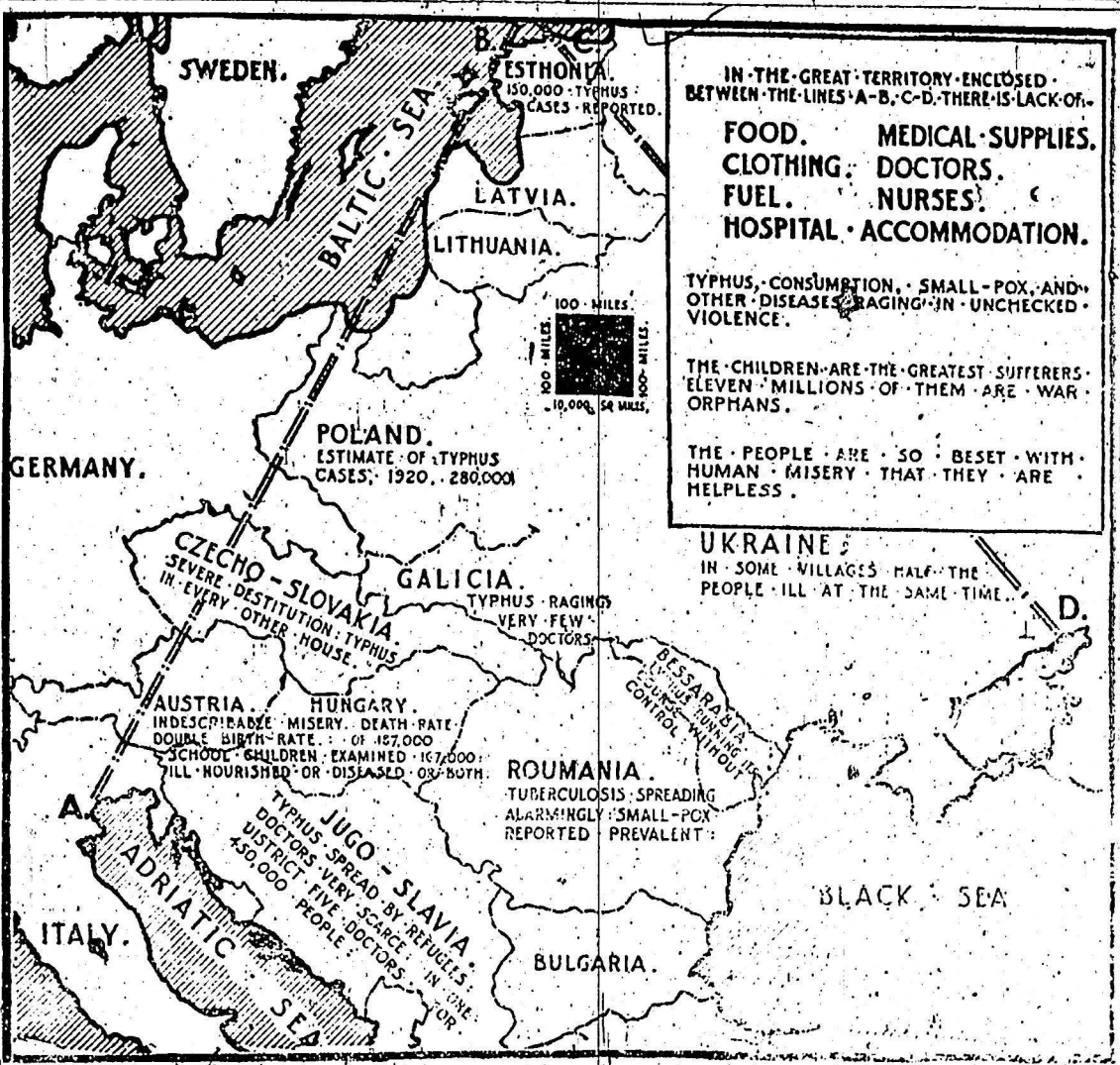

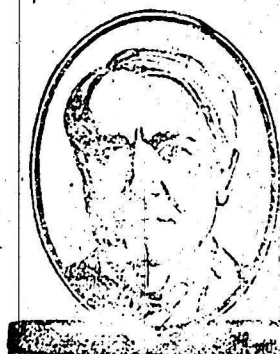
