Luxury Tax Removed.

All "luxury taxes" imposed at the last session of Parliament have been abolished with the exception of those on spirituous and alcoholic liquors, medicated wines, patent and proprietary preparations containing alcohol, lime and fruit juices, fortified spirits and strong waters, perfumery and toilet preparations, playing cards and confectionery.

On and after December 20th no luxury taxes are to be collected on goods other than those mentioned. Merchants and dealers report increased business as a result of the lifting of the unpopular tax, which has been imposed for the past several months.

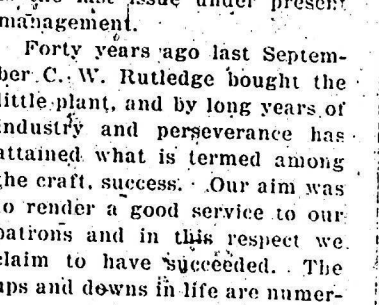
