Luxury Tax Removed.

All "luxury taxes" imposed at

the last session of Parliament have been

abolished with the exception of those

on spirituous and alcoholic liquors,

medicated wines, patent and proprie-

etary preparations containing alcohol,

lime and fruit juices, fortified spirits

and strong waters, perfumery and pi-

tole preparations, playing cards and

confectionery.

On and after December 20th no

luxury taxes are to be collected on

goods other than those mentioned.
