

EDITORIAL NOTES

Grand Trunk earnings for December were a million dollars more than for the same month the previous year. So much for a National Railway.

Money by-laws are evidently less popular than they once were. The last municipal elections throughout the province turned most of them down.

It is unfair to hold Prohibition responsible for the evils of the liquor traffic in Ontario, where importation and storage of liquor is legalized by Dominion Statute for private use, while its sale is prohibited by the Province. The responsibility for the situation and results should be placed where it belongs.

Get Ready For April 18

The prohibition football has been kicked around by one Government and another until temperance people hardly know where they are at. But it is necessary to keep the ball rolling until it passes the goal. Temperance workers must keep in view the vote in Ontario on the 18th of April and organize again for the fight. The liquor traffic is unscrupulous in its tactics, well-munitioned with money and has numerous allies, but the game is undoubtedly going one way. Following the vote recently taken in Nova Scotia, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta the Dominion Government is prohibiting importation of liquor into the four provinces on and after the first of February. Ontario will be the next one to go "bone dry." Let us be ready.

Carrying Firearms

There still seem to be numbers of people who do not fully understand that the carrying of revolvers and other concealed weapons is a serious offence. A letter has just been sent to County Constables and Provincial Police throughout the Province which says: "There appears recently to have been a great increase in the number of persons illegally carrying weapons, and the Attorney-General desires that you will make an earnest, special and particular effort to see that this practice is stopped. In order to do so, it will be necessary for you to search all suspected persons, to prosecute them, and to forward to the superintendent of the Provincial Police. It is also asked that in cases, where in the opinion of the police, weapons are being carried under a permit without who seems to be an adequate reason, such carrying shall be reported. The Crown Attorneys have also been sent a letter, asking them to render what assistance they can."
