

Glenelg Board of Health

The following is an abstract from the report of Dr. Hutton, Medical Officer of Health for Glenelg, for 1920. In my report this year, I am making running epitome of the condition of several Schools in the Township, to each of which I have paid my annual visit. I find that the Trustees of some sections have made an honest endeavor to improve the School buildings and out-buildings. I have on my previous visits tried to impress on the Trustees the necessity of having the School House and premises made clean and habitable. To the closets, which are the worst feature, I have paid more attention. At my first visit 5 or 6 years ago, I found them all in the most deplorable condition. Since then, in the majority of the Sections, the Trustees have set to work and built new and very efficient closets. In a few little or nothing has been done. In this respect, I must thank the Trustees in the following Sections for their co-operation in complying with my reasonable requests, viz.: S. S. No. 5, S. S. No. 3, U. S. No. 3, S. S. No. 1, S. S. No. 6, Sep. S. No. 3, Sep. S. No. 7, and S. S. No. 9, who have each made an effort, in one way or another, to do something to improve their Schools, and promises and oaths stand in order of merit as enumerated above.

S. S. No. 4, S. S. No. 18 and U. S. S. No. 5 have done nothing, drifting on to worse.

This year the Provincial Board has issued its detailed report on the different schools as herewith attached, and sent to the Board, one to the M. O. H. and one sent to the Provincial Board of Health. Cairns member and R. sanitary inspector; [No] 6. to appoint School Attendance Officer, did over.

Following accounts were ordered to be paid: Election expenses, \$32. W. H. Thurston, \$12.32; and Magpie Sheep Insurance, \$35. J. B. Moore, Fritchard's bridge, J. Caravel, \$4.70. The Clerk was instructed to order copies of the Municipal World for the Council.

Archibald Burnett, That as a vacancy occurred in the Council, owing to insufficient numbers nominating, it is hereby ordered that a new election be held at the Town Hall on Sunday the 24th inst., at 1:00 p.m., and should a poll be required, the election shall take place in several polling divisions on the first, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., for election of the said member and to give the proper notices.

In honor of all who served and in loving memory of those who died for the cause of Freedom and Justice.


