Putting a Tape Line on the Stars

The measuring of the great star distances is justly rated as one of the most remarkable achievements of astronomical science up to date. For, although many stars have been weighed, no method has been even whereby their size could be ascertained.

Thus, for instance, the size of Sirius, the dog star—so interesting to us by reason of its extraordinary brilliancy and also on account of historical records concerning it, which date back to the days when the pyramids were built in Egypt—has never been definitely ascertained, though it is believed to be at least forty times as big our sun and more than 100 times as

bright. Phoenyx and Betelgeuse, as well as from the earth, form a triangle in the night sky. But the dog star is near to us, as stellar distances measured by means of light travel 60,000 miles a second, would require twenty years to reach Betelgeuse about eight光years away.

There is a giant sun. If our sun were equally big, the earth in its journey around the sun would be included in certain flaming masses at an average distance of 100 miles from the sun. Thus one in a nation of the empires of stars which have been measured, we supposed, however, is a relatively solid sun.
