The Easter services were of a most inspiring character and the spirit of the Day was much in evidence throughout. Special preparations were made for the accommodation of the choir. The pulpit and choir gallery has been re-arranged and this has greatly added to the effectiveness of the ministry of praise. The improvements contribute a distinct advantage to the Church's service and worship.

The decorations were most beautiful. Immediately in front of the communion rail were two large pedestals on which stood two lovely plants of the most perfect Easter lilies we have seen. On either side of the pulpit and within the rail were exquisite roses, carnations, geraniums, lilies and laurels, the emblem of victory. Perhaps the most conspicuous and withal the most inspiring of the decorations was a massive white cross decorated with white carnations set at the back of the choir against a crimson background embedded in a cluster of carnations and lilies.

The Morning Service commenced with processional hymn "Welcome, Happy Morning". The Rector proceeded to the altar. The Holy Sacrament was offered and the faithful availed themselves of the opportunity of receiving once again the memories of His passion. The subject of the sermon was "Mary at the Sepulchre".

The Evening Service was very delightful; the singing excellent. The Processional Hymn was "Christ the Lord is Risen To-day," and the Recessional Hymn "I Know that My Redeemer Liveth." The Subject of the address was "The Same Jesus." All the members of the Church felt that a very happy time had been spent together in God's House. The congregation was delighted to see Mrs. Hollingshead present at the Evening Service, this being the first time she had been able to attend a service in the church for nearly eight years.

The Annual Easter Vestry Meeting will be held on Monday evening, next April 4th, at 8 o'clock.

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
