The late William Artley

The late William Artley, who died on Thursday, April 21, 1921, at 80 years of age, was born in Yorkshire, England, 82 years ago, December 15th, 1840, and came to Canada with his father's family when about twelve years old. He was educated in Toronto, Township, but possessed the pioneer spirit characteristic of so many sons and daughters of the Mother Country, they sought and in the new country in the County of Grey in the early fifties. They made the journey from Toronto to Collinsford by train, where they waited several days for a boat to the north. (The mother and young children were conveyed in an ox cart, as a wagon was unavailable, while the father and the rest of the family walked to their new home in the bush in the Township of Grey, near Walters Falls. In 1857, he was married the second time to Miss Emily of Walters Falls, who preceded him 4 years ago. After residing on the farm and then in 1907 took up residence with his sister, Miss Annie Artley, on Wellington street in Markdale. He was a member of the Methodist Church for sixty years and at his home, the ministers always found a glad welcome. He had many memories of the early pioneer ministers sent by the Conference to Walters Falls and its vicinity. He was very fond of flowers and also gardening and was very successful in keeping his bees. He learned the art of the taxidermist and had secured and preserved many splendid specimens of the wild life of the field.

About 6 months ago he was stricken with a paralytic stroke. While he partially rallied, it proved to be a fatal illness and after many weeks of suffering, he passed peacefully away on Thursday evening, the 21st inst. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon, Rev. A. P. Stanley conducted the service at the home. Interment took place in the Methodist Cemetery, Walters Falls, Rev. Edward Burgess, of Walters Falls conducting the burial service at the graveside.

He is survived by two brothers, John, of Meaford; and Jeffrey, of Markdale, and two sisters, Mrs. Robt. Clarke, of Griersville, and Miss Annie Artley, of Markdale.

Obituary

A much respected and life-long resident of Euphrasia passed away at her home near Biantyre on Monday evening, April 18th, in the person of Miss Maria Davise, in her 74th year. Deceased has been confined to her home for the past six months through poor health, yet was of a cheerful spirit.

She is survived by one sister, Mrs. E. Wright, who has resided with her for some years. The funeral took place to Temple Hill Cemetery on Thursday afternoon and was largely attended, service being conducted at the home and graveside by the deceased's pastor, Rev. J. Lennox, assisted by Rev. Mr. Smyth, of Walters Falls.

The sympathy of all goes out to the bereaved friends and relatives in the hour of trial.
