Though Dead, Turns Up Alive.

Missing Glencoe Resident is Now Reported Living.

About fifteen or twenty years ago, John Jardine, well-known resident of Glencoe, disappeared very mysteriously, and was never heard from till a few days ago. He was a well-to-do and honorable man, and consisted in every way, and highly respected by his neighbors and all with whom he was acquainted. It will be remembered he left the town in which he was working, leaving his watch and pipe behind him, as well as his working tools. He was an inveterate smoker, and the leaving of the pipe was the greatest source of surprise to those who knew him and heard of his departure.

Though diligent search had been made, nothing was discovered, and for a time there was much speculation as to the cause of his disappearance, and some were even of the opinion he had met with foul play.

Years passed, however, and no tidings came. Miss Jardine went West a couple of years later, and in time was married, and is living in Edmonton. She was a woman of deep religious temperament, and possessing boundless faith in the safety of her brother.

Rumors are in circulation now, and they seem to be well substantiated, that the missing man was met—in Michigan, at or near the American Soo, by Wm. Burnett, son of the late Mrs. David Burnett, and a near neighbor and boyhood chum of Jardine's. He recognized Jardine, so the story goes, but Jardine at first denied his name but afterwards admitted his identity to Burnett. He then enquired for the address of his sister, Annie, but Burnett was unable to give the desired information, and wrote to some of the Glencoe Township acquaintances for particulars. We have not learned whether Jardine has since met or written to his sister, but from the nature of the information at hand it is but reasonable to believe that he is still alive. The rumor further says that Jardine has been a resident of the Michigan Soo district, where he has been farming for the past seven or ten years, and practically ever since he disappeared. Jardine disclaims any knowledge whatever of leaving his vicinity and from the circumstances surrounding his disappearance, we have no doubt he is telling the truth.
