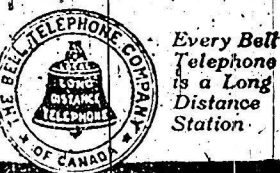

EUPHRASIA COUNCIL

The Council met on June 10th as an adjourned Court of Revision, all the members present, Mr. Hutchinson in the chair. The Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

The following action was taken—The assessment of George Harbottle reduced \$100; the West 1/2 of lot 29, con. 7, assessed to Robt. Clark; E 1/2 of lot 22, con. 2, to be assessed to John Stoutenburg and the same to be taken up from the assessment of Leslie Prentice; S. E. part of 24 to be assessed to George Hutchinson.

Erskine—Patton—That the Reeve, Patton and Hutchinson be a committee to go over the Roll.—Carried.

The Court adjourned until the Committee reports.

The Council resumed at 2 o'clock for the dispatch of Township business, all members present, the Reeve in the chair. The Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

Patton—Erskine—That R. J. Orr be instructed to have the road allowance on 21 and 22 side road, con. 11, underbrushed.—Carried.

Patton—Hutchinson—That the Clerk be authorized to order a Buss Road Grader.—Carried.

Orr—Hutchinson—That the Treasurer receive from R. J. Orr the sum of \$150 for sale of old culvert, opposite lots 27 and 28, in the 8th con., Township of Euphrasia, sold at 5 p.m. on June 3rd, 1921, to George W. Taylor, of lot 27, in the 8th concession.—Carried.

By-Law No. 7, authorizing the borrowing of \$15,000, to be lifted as needed, was passed and filed.

We, your Committee, beg leave to report as follows: That we found the road in a good condition with the exception of about 30 rods which needs gravelling and a small culvert. We did not go to the Townline of Holland, as the stone complained of was removed. Respectfully submitted—J. T. Miller and J. W. Patton, Committee.

Hutchinson—Erskine—That the Report of the Committee be received and adopted.—Carried.

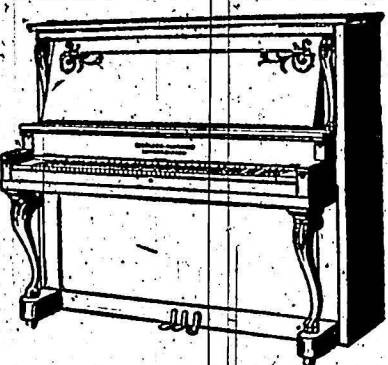

Mrs. Hannah Steer

Mrs. Hannah A. Steer, who died on Sunday, June 26th, 1921, at the residence of her son-in-law, Pearce McAtter, 254 St. Clarens ave., Toronto, was in her 90th year. She had been confined to bed for a month, having suffered a stroke. Mrs. Steer was born in Hull, England, in 1831, and was married at the age of 16. Three months before her 19th birthday, she sailed with her husband, George Steer, to Canada and took up residence in Albion, Ont., then, on to Toronto (Gore) where they took to farming and later in Markdale. Her husband died 22 years ago. For twelve years she had resided in Toronto. She attended the Methodist Church. The late Mrs. Steer was a resident of Markdale for 22 years, up to 12 years ago, when she took a stroke and had to be removed to the home of her daughter in Toronto.
Surviving are two sons, Edmond and John, and five daughters, Mrs. E. W. Mott and Mrs. A. Stevens, of Chicago, Mrs. M. McDonald, Mrs. Mary McAtter and Miss Lytte Steer, of Toronto.
