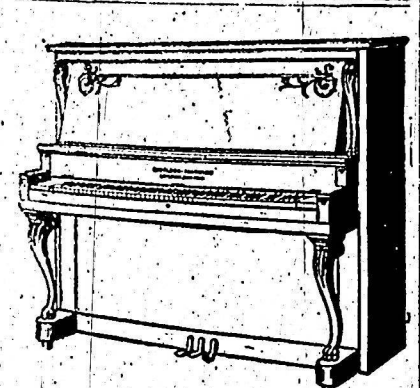

GLENELG COUNCIL

The Council met on July 9th, pursuant to adjournment, all the members present, the Reeve in the chair. The Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. Letters, circulars and accounts were read as follows: Reports on expenditures in the several Wards of the Township were submitted; several circulars on road machinery; Dr. Hutton, account for attendance on meeting of Health Officers' Association on May 16, 17 and 18th; F. J. Gaby, re Hydro Electric Power; M. Quillinan, sheep claim; By-Laws Nos. 616 and 617, re expenditures in 1920-1921, respectively, were introduced and read a first and second time.

The time for Revision Court Business having expired, matters of the School boundaries before the Court were transferred to Council jurisdiction.

Turnbull—Livingstone—That the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to sign and submit to the Minister of Public Works and Highways, of the petition of the Corporation of the Township of Glenelg, showing that during the period January 1920 to December 1920 there has been expended upon the Township Roads the sum of \$4,237.93 and requesting the Statutory Grant on that amount, as provided by the Ontario Highways Act and Amendments thereto.—Carried.

Livingstone—M. Black—That lot 49, con. 2, E. G. R. and lot 19, con. 3, E. G. R. be placed in School Section No. 3 and Lots 1 to 5 inclusive, be struck off from S. S. No. 9, on account of error in By-Law No. 598.—Carried.

Livingstone—M. Black—That this Council take no action in changing lots No. 2 and 3, con. 5, as requested by Trustees of S. S. No. 3.—Carried.

Livingstone—M. Black—That Michael Quillinan be paid \$12.00 for sheep killed by dogs and S. H. Wright \$1.50 for inspecting and certificate.—Carried.

M. Black—J. J. Black—That P. J. Haley be paid \$140.00 for repairs to Anderson bridge, lot No. 15, con. 5.—Carried.

By-Laws 616 and 617, respecting expenditures in 1920 and 1921, respectively, were read a third time and ordered to be engrossed on By-Law Book.

Livingstone—Turnbull—That the Reeve be paid \$8.00 for trip and 30 miles travelled in conveying Alice and Kate McGrade to House of Refuge, Markdale.—Carried.
