Department of Agriculture

From June 11th till July 9th, the members of the Department of Agriculture, Markdale, were engaged in Sheep Dipping Demonstrations. Every district, which made application to us received attention. 27 Demonstrations were planned for; of these 25 were carried to conclusion.

In order to choose the places where Demonstrations were to be held, we sent 1058 circulars to farmers having sheep, requesting them to make application before May 25th, if it were possible to secure 200 sheep. Lambs, of course, were supposed to be brought. These circulars went to every district in the County of Grey, so if any places were not visited, where there are a large number of sheep, the reason these places were not visited was because of not receiving applications.

Every township was visited. Approximately 6000 sheep and lambs were dipped. A charge of 5c per head for matured sheep was made. All lambs were free of charge. It required \$180.00 of Cooper's Sheep Dipping Powder to do the work.

A complete financial statement will go forward to the farmers who had their sheep dipped, in the course of a couple of weeks. The Cooper's Sheep Dipping Powder was purchased from the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers', 123 Simcoe Street, Toronto. It cost \$30.00 per case.

SHIPPING WOOL

The season for shipping wool closed July 15th. Grey County increased its shipments by 100%. The days previous to closing, 124 Grey County farmers, delivered 22,000 pounds of wool. There were 80 more shippers who had received supplies—wool sacks and paper twine—who had not delivered, their holdings. Undoubtedly many of these would ship their wool before July 15th.

It is to be regretted, however, that so much wool is being held in farmers' hands. This is because the low prices locally offered has created a feeling that wool has no value this year. It has value and is being disposed of to Canadian Mills, when graded. Why not ship it then, have it graded and put up for market? When the demand warrants, it will be sold to the highest bidder.

Large quantities always command attention, hence more chance for sale presents itself, if all the wool held in individual farmers' hands were gathered into one warehouse. Here it would be graded and on short notice could and would be shipped to the buyer, without delay.

The Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers', when first organized in 1917, found that Canadian Wools could not be sold to Canadian Woolen manufacturers. By careful grading this organization of Canadian farmers has been able to sell the greatest part of the 1920 clip to our own manufacturers. This body has created a market for Canadian wool. Every farmer should therefore patronize them.
