



The remains of the late Mr. John
Hales, whose sudden death at Bram-
pton, we reported in last week's cor-
respondence, were brought to the home of his son-
in-law, Mr. Archie Sinclair, C. P. R.
agent, at Flesherton Station, where the
funeral took place on Wednesday

afternoon in Cemetery attended
by many sympathizing friends of the family. The deceased
was a member of the Methodist Church, but in the absence of the
Pastor the service at the house and grave was conducted by Rev. F. G.
Fowler, of Chalmers Church. The casket was covered with beautiful
floral tributes from the family and friends. Mr. Hales, who was 72
years of age, was born at Thornhill,
near Toronto, about two years after
his parents came from Ireland. Five
years later he came with them to Antemilia and grew to manhood
among the pioneers of the township.
Thirty-eight years ago he married
Miss Anna Craft of Osprey, and later
settled in this village, where he has
since resided. His wife died nearly
20 years ago. Mr. Hales was for
many years an ardent Orange-man.
He also had a military career and was
a sergeant in the old Volunteer Company
here. Now in the East (Grey)
Baptist, he was the Village Con-
stable here at his death. Three sons
and three daughters survive him: viz:
Charles, and William, Jr., at Weston;
Mrs. Hales, recently gone to the West;
Mrs. Peter Norris, at Dummers, Sask.,
and Archie Sinclair, of Ceylon.

Death and death was that of Mrs.
Wm. Moore, who at the early age
of 70 years passed away at her home
in Victoria Corners on Tuesday,
September 16th, 1921, leaving be-
sides her husband four children to
mourn the loss of a mother's love and
care. The funeral took place at
Flesherton Cemetery on Thursday
afternoon in the public cemetery, where
the remains were laid beside her husband,
who died 20 years ago. Her
pastor, Rev. J. H. Oke, conducted the
obsequies and in the course of an appropriate discourse at the house re-
ferred fittingly to the deceased who
had been over 40 years a faithful
member of the Methodist Church. We
have known her long and can say of
her that she leaves the fragrance of
