

Mrs. John Greenwood

With the falling of the autumn leaves, this well-beloved pioneer mother, Mrs. John Greenwood, passed to the Eternal Rest on Monday morning, October 24th. Her maiden name was Miss Annie Cameron and she was born in the Township of Vaughan, September 8, 1846, thus being in her 86th year. Of the well-known Cameron family of eight, she was the last survivor. When she was thirteen years of age the family moved up to Bentinck and on March 23, 1870, she was most happily wedded to Mr. Greenwood, who survives, and is in good health despite his fourscore and three years. To them were born four children, two dying in infancy. The surviving members are: W. J. on the homestead, and Susan (Mrs. J. H. Robson). Mrs. Geo. Robertson is a step-daughter, but the relationship was always as close as if of her own blood. Mrs. Greenwood was a woman of genial disposition, quiet and thoughtful for others, a devout, steadfast follower of the Master, and looking back through the years, we can recall many incidents of her kindly influence. Some years ago she suffered from a stroke, and it cast a shadow over her declining years, being more or less of an invalid. During these years she has been most patiently and attentively cared for by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. W. J. Greenwood. Too much praise cannot be voted out to her. Last Friday she suffered from another stroke and then lingered consciousness till the end. The funeral took place to Zion Cemetery on Wednesday afternoon, where her pastor, Rev. C. G. F. Cole, conducted an appropriate service.
