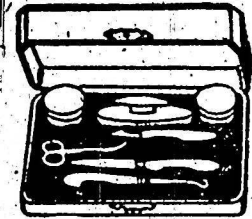

The Late William Sargent

The late William Sargent, who passed away on Tuesday, October 25th, and to whose death we referred briefly last week, was born in Ireland nearly 78 years ago. When he was about two years old, the family came to Canada and for a time lived at Sand Hill. They then moved to Holland, and after a few years returned to Sand Hill. In 1868 the deceased was united in marriage to Miss Eliza (Carriage) and the young couple, the next year, moved to the farm near Berkeley, where they resided until nine years ago, when the deceased lost his sight. Since that time they have resided in Markdale.

The late Mr. Sargent was a very highly esteemed man by his neighbors and his sterling worth will long be remembered by those who came in contact with him. For many years he was one of the active members of Berkeley L.O.L. No. 176, but with failing health, he was compelled to retire from membership. In religion he was a Methodist and in politics a Conservative.

The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon, last, to Markdale Cemetery. Rev. Frank N. Boyes, his pastor, conducted services in the Methodist Church and preached a comforting sermon. There was a large attendance of old friends and neighbors, who were present to pay their respects to the departed. The following acted as pall bearers: R. J. Boyd, Jas. Welsh, I. Elder, Robt. Crawford, T. H. Wilson and A. E. Colgan.

The deceased bore his affliction with a true Christian fortitude and his sufferings during the last few months of his life were borne with-out complaint. His widow, who has been constant in her attention during his long illness, never grew tired of ministering to the relief of his sufferings and is now left to mourn the loss of one whom she loved dearly. She too has been sorely afflicted for several years with sciatica.

Mrs. John Greenwood

With the falling of the autumn leaves, this well-beloved pioneer passed. Mrs. John Greenwood, mother to the Eternal Rest on Monday morning, October 24th. Her maiden name was Miss Annie Cameron and she was born in the Township of Vaughan, September 8, 1836, thus being in her 86th year. Of the well-known Cameron family of eight, she was the last survivor. When she was thirteen years of age the family moved up to Bentinck and on March 23, 1870, she was most happily wedded to Mr. Greenwood, who survives, and is in good health despite his four score and three years. To them were born four children, two dying in infancy. The surviving members are: W. J., on the homestead, and Susan (Mrs. J. H. Robson). Mrs. Geo. Roberson is a step-daughter, but the relationship was always as close as if of her own blood. Mrs. Greenwood was a woman of genial disposition, quiet and thoughtful for others, a devout, steadfast follower of the Master, and, looking back through the years, we can recall many incidents of her kindly influence. Some years ago she suffered from a stroke, and it cast a shadow over her declining years, being more or less of an invalid. During these years she has been most patiently and attentively cared for by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. W. J. Greenwood. Too much praise cannot be meted out to her. Last Friday she suffered from another stroke and then lingered agonizingly till the end. The funeral took place to Zion Cemetery on Wednesday afternoon, where her pastor, Rev. G. P. Cole, conducted an appropriate service.

Church Opening

St. Peter's R. C. Church, Durham, Formally Opened.

The solemn blessing of the new St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church in Durham took place on Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock; Very Rev. Dean Halm, of Ayrton, assisted by Rev. A. Camps, of Mount Forest, performed the ceremony, while the pastor, Rev. J. S. McGoe, acted as master of ceremonies. Rev. P. J. Maloney, of Walkerton, was the preacher for the occasion and, as the crowd of people, was very large and I could not get into the church, the sermon was delivered in the open from the front door steps.

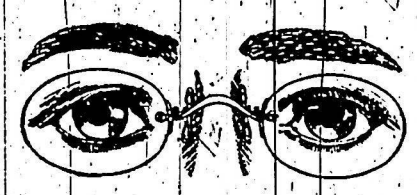
Before the blessing of the edifice commenced, the pastor briefly referred to the solemn occasion, and the source of joy it ought to be to every Catholic to know that another edifice had been completed in which the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass might be celebrated. He also heartily thanked the township of Durham for the many evidences of interest which they had shown while the work was in operation. He implored their interest as marks of good Christians, because they saw another edifice being erected for the honor and the glory of God.

Rev. P. J. Maloney delivered a very impressive sermon, he commenced by referring to that which is most noticeable on every Catholic Church, the emblem of Christianity, the cross. "And," said he, "just as the cross is most noticeable on our churches and public buildings, so likewise should the lessons which it conveys and teaches be the most influential in our every day life." The Rev. speaker strongly emphasized the fact that the cross, which was placed on the church, was a guarantee that nothing but the doctrine of Christ and Christ crucified would be preached in the Church.

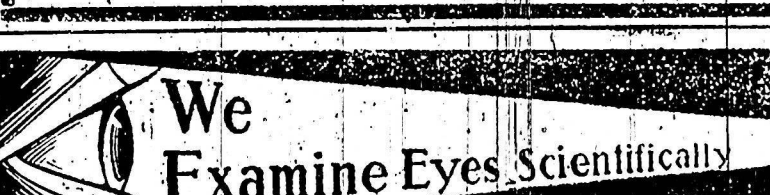
