Soldiers' Memorial

The prospect that is on foot for the erection of a Soldiers' Memorial in Markdale is meeting with good progress, over \$1,500 being already subscribed. This is about one-half the amount required. Those in charge cannot easily get in touch with all who may desire to assist the worthy undertaking, but contributions will be gladly received by the Treasurer, A. E. Colgan, publisher of The Standard, by mail or otherwise, and will be duly credited, as well as publicly acknowledged together with the full list of contributions later on.

The proposed Memorial, in order to prove useful as well as emblematic, and also insure perpetual remembrance, will be combined with a substantially built mortuary chapel and erected in a convenient, conspicuous place in the public cemetery. These conveniences for interment during the winter season are considered a necessity in well-regulated cemeteries in this northern climate. After the customary burial service, which is held in this chapel, the caskets are lowered by an automatic elevator and placed in the vault beneath, where they remain until spring, when on a day appointed, relatives may accompany the cemetery manager in making the final interment.

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Chippawa Power Plant

The Chippawa power plant, which officially began generating power last week, is the most ambitious work of its kind ever attempted in any part of the world.

Preliminary Engineering Work—Began in May, 1917.

Actual Excavation—Began March, 1918.

Water Turned On—December 24th, 1921.

First Power Developed—December 28th, 1921.

General Plan—To divert water from the Niagara River above the falls at Chippawa, where there is a drop of 150 feet, and carry same in a canal approximately 12 1/2 miles long, discharging same through the largest turbines ever built, at the power house located near Queenston.

Maximum Canal Capacity—Sufficient for nearly 600,000 horsepower.

Planned Generating Capacity—650,000 horsepower.

Maximum Power Under Treaty with U. S.—550,000 horsepower.

Saving when Maximum Generating Equipment Installed—Six million tons of coal and about \$30,000,000 per year as against the cost of steam power.

Now Installed—One generator of 550,000 horsepower, with a second almost ready.

Later Installations—Total of five units to be in by December, 1922. Five other units, all larger, to be put in within five years.

Total Amount of Excavated Material—17,382,000 cubic yards.

Total Amount of Concrete—450,000 cubic yards.
