The first game staged was between the girls' teams representing the two schools and was won by the Shelburne girls by one goal. The teams were very evenly matched and the game, from start to finish, was most interesting. The only score was made in the second quarter by Shelburne. The visitors are a well balanced aggregation and showed evidence of good coaching. The locals all played hard and each individual did her very best to win. They lined up as follows:—

In the first period a very fast pace was set and some excellent hockey was played by both teams. The visitors had it over the locals in team work, showing that their training had been more thorough. This spasm ended 2 all. In the second period Markdale took the lead and the last period commenced, with the score 4 to 3 in their favor.
