Department of Agriculture

There has been some criticism of the New Dairy Standards Act, which has recently come into effect. This criticism is largely due to lack of knowledge on the milk producers' part.

There are three main clauses in the Act. Firstly—That all milk or cream must be paid on the basis of its fat content, not weight only.

Secondly—Cream will be purchased according to grade. This clause does not come into effect at present, and Thirdly—It has become necessary to pasteurize whey of other by-products which are used for feeding purposes.

Every Creamery buys its cream on the basis of fat content now. The opposition is coming from the cheese factories; yet it is known to dairy experts that about 1% pounds of cheese extra is made from 100 lbs. of 3.5% than 3% milk.

This in 1922 would have been worth 22c more. According to the pooling system, the farmer producing 3% milk would have received as much as he would from the 3.5% milk.

The pasteurization of skim milk and whey is necessary because of the spread in Tuberculosis in Ontario flocks. In 1921 it is known that 19% of our hogs were affected with the disease.

This is an enormous loss which could be stopped. Canada holds premier place in the Cheese-trade of Great Britain. To hold it we must produce under a Dairy Standards Act.

Our trade in Hogs has seriously declined. We only hold fifth place. New Zealand and Danish butter is selling in Canada and United States. Its quality is ideal. It is finding ready sale.

Canadian farmers must wake up. The above mentioned articles are produced under the Standard Dairy Acts. Canada, to keep pace must follow the example. If further information is required, write to the Department of Agriculture, Markdale. We will endeavor to clear up any difficulties.

Dairy Standard Act

Markdale, sent some samples of Sweet Clover Hay and Oat Straw to the Dominion Pathologist at Ottawa requesting a report. The following is an extract from the same: We submit it to the farmers in the hope that it may explain a few points which undoubtedly worry many who are using Sweet Clover as hay at the present time.

Forage Poisoning was the probable cause of death. This disease is caused by the toxin of the B. botulinus and is found in small pockets in the fodder—not being evenly distributed in the fodder. You will therefore understand that it would only be by chance that a sample of food would contain the organism or toxin.

The better way to collect a specimen is to send the contents of the stomach and other portions of the alimentary tract for examination.

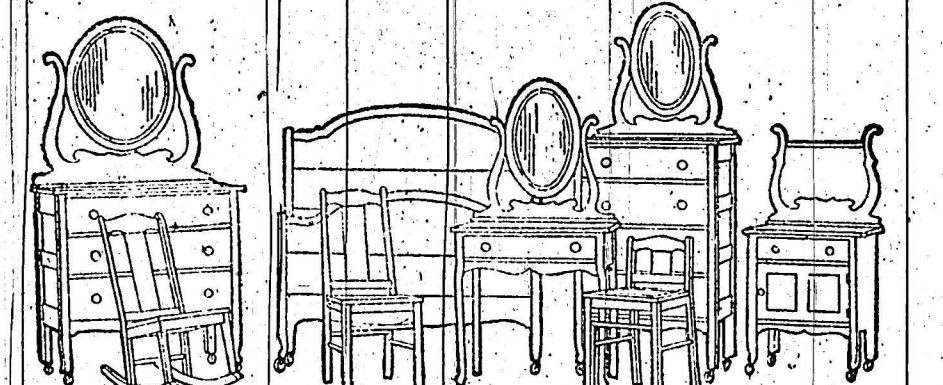

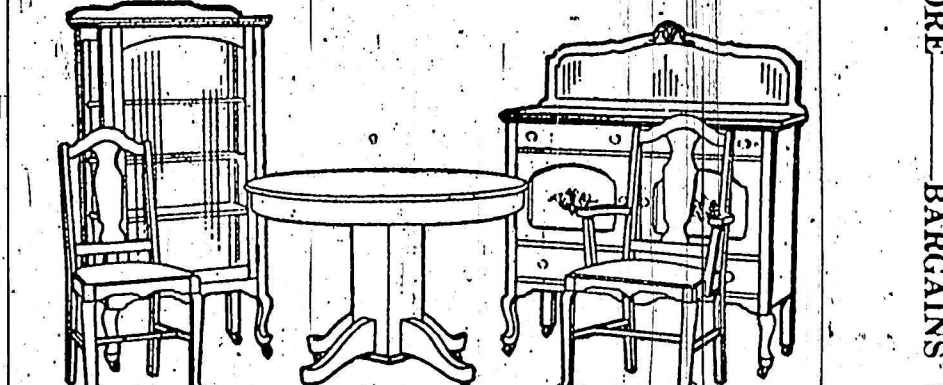

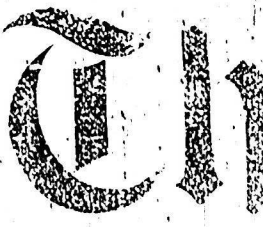
