Would Abolish Separate Schools.

Regina, Sask., Feb. 26.—At Friday evening's session of the Saskatchewan School Trustees' Association, B. F. Willour, one of the delegates, introduced a resolution seeking the immediate abolition of the entire separate school system of the province.

The resolution, which carried, called for the establishment of a system of national schools in the province and asked that the English language be "the sole medium of instruction, and an effort be made to inculcate in the pupils a spirit of tolerance and unity, as opposed to the present system of perpetuating racial and religious differences."

Farmers Be Careful Word has just been received, saying that there are agents circulating the story that the Provincial Government is planning 20 acres of silk trees on their demonstration farms. This story is absolutely false and without foundation. Farmers are cautioned against these agents.

Clean Your Seed These winter days offer a good opportunity to clean your Seed Grain. Spring will be here shortly. Getting Seed Grain ready will help to meet the rush. Moreover, cleaning your grain now means that more time will be spent on the work. It pays well, because proper cleaning of the seed results in an increase of 15% to 50%, according to the kind of grain sown. Getting rid of weeds is easier done in the winter time than in the rush of the summer time.

Seed will be scarce this year. Perhaps a few farmers will have some for sale. You will not know till you run the grain through the fanning mill.
