Time For A Change

(Forest Free Press.) The Legislature can confer on every town and village in the Province a great and lasting benefit by enacting legislation that will provide for the holding of municipal elections at some time other than during the Christmas season. Business men in the towns and villages cannot give the same attention to municipal affairs during the busy holiday season that they could, and would, at other times. For this reason the towns and villages have not had the benefits of having their most interested citizens taking part in municipal affairs. Now that the women are to take more part than heretofore in municipal elections the need of a change is greater than before, because during the holiday season the time of the women is almost entirely devoted to children's entertainments and other festivities. The month of November is objected to because a large number of voters in lake ports would not be home at that time. The first week in February would be a suitable time, both in town and country, the holiday rush being over, and spring activities not yet started. If our representatives in the legislature will give this important matter due consideration the necessary legislation will be passed this session.
